Reauthorization of major government programs

Higher Education Act (HEA)

 Authorizes many major education programs, usually for four years

National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA)

• Defines the next year's military strategy and funding levels, and usually includes reforms to other government entities

Farm Bill


- Authorizes through 2023 most agricultural support and food assistance programs, including SNAP
- Also includes some rural infrastructure spending

Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)

• Approves five years of funding for the FAA in addition to other policy reforms including drones and funding for some infrastructure projects





Biography

- Kavanaugh grew up in Bethesda, Maryland and attended Yale University for both his B.A. and J.D.
- In the late 1990s, he worked for Ken Starr during the special investigation that led to the impeachment trial of Bill Clinton.
- From 2001-2003, he was senior associate counsel and later staff secretary to President George W. Bush
- In 2006, Kavanaugh was confirmed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit
- On July 9, 2018, President Trump nominated Kavanaugh to the Supreme Court

Notable decisions

- 2011: Wrote a dissent claiming the individual mandate in the Affordable Care Act could be considered a tax, and therefore should not be heard in court until a later date
- 2012: Ruled **EPA's** programs to regulate air pollution across state lines unlawful for reasons related to states' rights
- 2015: Found that the Consumer Finance Protection Bureau (CFPB) could be sued by entities that it regulated
- *Meshal v. Higgenbotham* (2016): Concurred with throwing out a claim by an American that he had been disappeared by the FBI in a Kenyan black site





Trump administration announces \$12B in aid for farmers



- On July 24, the Trump administration announced it would allocate \$12 billion in emergency aid to help U.S. farmers harmed by the current trade war
- The aid package would have three elements: direct payments to farmers, the expansion of a program that buys food surpluses and distributes them to food banks, and the promotion of U.S. goods abroad
- China, which bought \$14 billion worth of oilseeds from the U.S. last year, has imposed retaliatory tariffs on \$45 billion worth of U.S. goods, including agricultural products like soybeans, pork, corn and wheat







The Trump administration releases final rule expanding association health plans (AHPs)

The rule is a follow-up to an executive order President Trump signed in October 2017



AHPs

- Allow groups of small businesses to pool together to purchase health insurance, giving them more purchasing power
- Do not have to follow the same rules as individual policies sold under the ACA
- Expand the availability of cheaper, skimpier health plans
 - Some experts argue that this could raise costs and damage the ACA marketplaces



Trump's October EO:

- Directed federal agencies to **expand access to AHPs**
- Allowed individuals to purchase insurance plans **across state lines**
 - Currently, insurance markets are regulated at the state level
- Extended the amount of time for which individuals can have short-term plans
 - Short-term plans typically cover less than what the ACA mandates. Under Obama, individuals could purchase these plans for up to 90 days in order to make up for unexpected coverage gaps

What's new:

- Allows some individuals who are self-employed to join AHPs, as opposed to only small businesses
- Eases federal regulations that require associations be from the same state and prevent associations from forming exclusively to provide health coverage

The House is in recess until September 4, but the Senate is only scheduled to recess August 6-13

Nominations



- 252 nominees are awaiting confirmation by the Senate
- Stall tactics by Democrats and some Republicans limit the number that can be confirmed
- Trump nominated Brett Kavanaugh on July 9, 2018 to succeed retiring Supreme Court Justice Anthony Kennedy
- The Senate Judiciary Committee
 is sorting through over 1 million
 pages of documents from
 Kavanaugh's career

Farm Bill



- The 2014 Farm Bill expires on September 30, 2018
- Both chambers have passed a version, but a few senators are blocking the bill from going to conference
- The House and Senate versions will take a long time to resolve issues regarding SNAP and crop insurance

Appropriations



- Government funding runs out on September 30, 2018
- The House has passed 6 out of 12 appropriations bills
- The Senate has passed 7 out of 12 appropriations bills
- Most bills must go to conference committee to resolve differences
- Trump has threatened to veto appropriations bills unless his immigration priorities are met


Existing Site Location



PURPOSE OF ITEM: Evaluation of Unsolicited Proposal from Greenway Foundation

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Receive direction on whether to pursue proposal or advertise for this work.

BACKGROUND:

Adams County received an unsolicited proposal for Government Relations Services for Adams County Colorado with regards to the Clear Creek Corridor, South Platte River and tributaries from the Greenway Foundation and Capitol Representatives.

The Greenway Foundation (TGF) and the government and community relations firm of Capitol Representatives (CR) submitted the following proposal for Adams County's consideration.

The Greenway Foundation and Capitol Representatives would serve as facilitators with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Omaha District for consideration of a new Reconnaissance Study or Federal Interest Determination (FID) of the South Platte River and tributaries in Adams County, with a possible first project in the Clear Creek Corridor. This new study would be undertaken with the intent of identifying potential ecosystem restoration projects that would be candidates for USACE funding.

The new Reconnaissance Study would also cover the South Platte River and tributaries in Adams County. This would build on the findings of the Corps of Engineers 2004 Adams County Reconnaissance Study recommendations.

In addition to TGF, CR (the latter having offices in both Denver and Washington, DC), would serve as the communications and government relations advisor to the County on this project. TGF would be the prime contractor with the County and CR would serve as subcontractor to TGF.

Staff is prepared to present an evaluation of the proposal.
